Biomechanical simulation of respiratory motion using CUDA for collision detection

Project Abstract

Time-resolved imaging of the thorax or abdominal area is affected by respiratory motion. Nowadays, 1D respiratory surrogates are used to estimate the current state of the lung during its cycle, but with rather poor results. This projects aims to improve the framework to predict the 3D lung motion based on a patient-specific finite element model of respiratory mechanics estimated from two CT images at end of inspiration (EI) and end of expiration (EE).

Background and Motivation

Respiratory motion is a source of artifacts in medical image acquisition, which is the basis for disease monitoring, therapy planning and intervention guidance. Currently, signals from devices such as spirometers, abdominal pressure belts or external markers are used as surrogates of respiratory motion. However, the 1D nature of these signals makes it difficult to estimate the 3D

We have presented a framework to estimate the patient's respiratory motion in [1]. The goal of this project is to decrease the computation time by implementing the collision detection using CUDA.

Student's Tasks Description

The student will be introduced to the SOFA framework and the novel modules introduced recently. As a first step towards CUDA implementation, an understanding of the current functions needs to be established. Furthermore, the CUDA framework needs to be understood and presented (e.g. kick-off presentation). SOFA framework already incorporates some CUDA functions and modules. The implementation of the collision model needs to be validated using simple scenes and extended to the complex lung setup.

Technical Prerequisites

All coding will be done in C++ using CUDA and is therefore an important skill required. Matlab is used for evaluation.
