- 1. (3 pts) Operators in C++

What are the values of c1, c2, f1 and f2 at the end of the following code snippet? Please explain.

```
int f1=12;
int f2=f1;
int c1=55+ ++f1;
int c2=55+ f2++;
```

2. (8 pts) Getting used to working with MS Visual Studio and SVN

- a. Checkout the SVN directory
 https://camplinux.in.tum.de/svn/trunk/teaching/TeachingWs10CPP/<YourFirstNam</p>
 e>/MyFirstVSProject
 (i.e. replace <YourFirstName> with your first name, all letters small). This is going to be your "playground" for this course.
- b. Open the MS Visual Studio solution file (with the extension .sln).
- c. Build and run the application to see what it prints on the command line.
- d. (4 pts) Modify the code as described within the main () function.
- e. Build and run the application again to see the difference.
- f. (4 pts *) Commit all the modified files into the repository.

3. (29 pts) I/O, algorithms

- a. (1 pt) Add a new MS Visual Studio project (choose "Win32 Console Application" within the "Visual Studio Installed Templates", leave the settings at the end of the wizard at the default values) called "Ex01_IOAlgorithms" to the existing MS Visual Studio solution from Question 2.
- b. (1 pt) Add a header file "functiondefs.h" into the "Header Files" folder of the project. All your functions definitions should go here.
- c. (1 pt) Add a .cpp file "functionimpls.cpp" into the "Source Files" folder of the project. All your function implementations should go here.
- d. (2 pt) Define an enumeration called PatternType with the following values: topDownEqui, bottomUpEqui, topDownLeft, bottomUpLeft, topDownRight, bottomUpRight.
- e. (8 pts) Define and implement a function

void getUserInput(unsigned int& lineCount, enum PatternType&
pt)

that:

- ⇒ prompts the user to enter a positive number
- ⇒ parses the user input into an unsigned int (hint: use stringstream from the STL!)
- ⇒ and keeps asking the user until the input is indeed a positive number (hint: use a while loop!), i.e. when the user enters "-1" (without the quotes), or non-numeric text like "20text" (without the quotes), the function asks again
- ⇒ puts the entered value into the passed input parameter lineCount, once the value is entered according to the specifications
- ⇒ prompts the user to enter the desired pattern in the form of an integer (remember: enum's can be used as int's!)
- ⇒ parses the user input into an unsigned int (hint: use stringstream from the STL!)
- ⇒ and keeps asking the user until the input is within the allowed range (hint: use a while loop!), i.e. one of the values defined in the enum PatternType
- \Rightarrow puts the entered value into the passed input parameter pt, once the value is entered according to the specifications

f. (8 pts) Define and implement a function

void printPattern(unsigned int lineCount, enum PatternType pt)
that draws the following patterns with the entered lineCount, based on the
parameter pt respectively (hint: use the switch statement):

Value of pt	Pattern to draw
topDownEqui	**** -**** *****
bottomUpEqui	***** - *** - ***
topDownLeft	* *** *** ****
bottomUpLeft	***** **** ***
topDownRight	* * * * * * * * * * * * * * * * * * *
bottomUpRight	***** * **** * ***

- g. (4 pts) Now, your application should prompt the user for input and then draw the corresponding pattern using the described functions within the main () function.
- h. Save everything within Visual Studio (i.e. the already open solution MyFirstVSProject.sln, and the new header and .cpp file, as well as the file with the main () function)
- i. Add the new files to the subversion.
- j. (4 pts *) Commit all the changes.

4. (4 pts) [OPTIONAL] Limits of basic datatypes

What values are in the variables var1, var2 and b at the end of the following code snippet? Can you explain why?

```
int var1 = 2147483648;
int var2 = -2147483649;
unsigned int b=4000;
b=-2;
```

5. **(4 pts) [OPTIONAL]** How are floating-point numbers represented in the computer? Describe it shortly.
