IBBM Project Proposal: Master thesis

Deep Learning Approach for Water-Fat Quantification of Bone Marrow MR Spectroscopy

Abstract

MRS data is composed of 1D spectra that can quantitatively characterize the tissue composition of *in-vivo*. This is especially useful because reaching the tissue is no longer a concern and it is non-destructive and non-invasive. The challenges come when the data needs to be analyzed.

The quantified PDFF is used to evaluate osteoporosis, metabolic diseases, and bone-/bone marrow-based cancers. Because of the nature of water and triglycerides, the spectral resolution is especially low. Their respective peaks are poorly resolved and overlapping. This presents challenges for accurate quantification. Therefore, we would like to explore the use of CNNs for automating this quantification, especially for the case of low resolution and noisy data.
