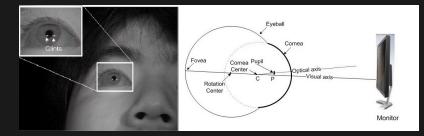


Figure: NIR light reflection and eye schematic

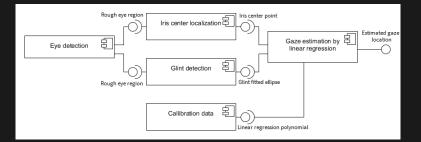


Figure: Component diagram

Linear Regression

- Simple to implement
- Efficient
- Robust
- Very useful to detect one specific thing

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Iris detection by means of gradients

- Simple to implement
- Efficient
- Robust
- Precise
- Specialized

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Iris detection by means of gradients - How it works

- Generate gradient map
- 2 Find places with high gradients
- 3 On each high gradient, create a line along the jump
- 4 Each pixel that is hit by the line gets incremented
- Select pixel with highest count

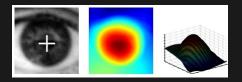


Figure: Eye image and resulting heatmap

Direct ellipse fitting

- Very simple to implement
- Very efficient
- Robust
- By putting smart constraints on a 5-DOF minimization problem, we get a set of 2 equations
- Up to six solutions pick the one with lowest error

Direct ellipse fitting

- But will one ellipsis be enough?
- Use 2 ellipses?

Example input

- Simple to implement
- Very efficient
- The difficult calculations are performed in callibration stage
- Possibly not the best performer

- Create a polynomial transformation function
- Input(variables) = eye center position, glint ellipse parameters
- Output = screen coordinates
- In callibration phase, let user look at many (15-30) points and calculate polynomial coefficients that minimize squared error
- In action phase, plug the actual values into the polynomial and hope for the best
