

What are the Problems with Texture-Less Objects?

- Lack of Texture prevents using **feature points** for efficient reduction of the search space
 - How to guarantee robustness and speed?
- Lack of Texture prevents using **texture-based similarity measures** like NCC, SSD, SAD etc.
 - What kind of robust features to use instead (e.g. illumination invariant etc.)?
 - ➤ How to evaluate this similarity measure efficiently?
 - How to evaluate this similarity measure robustly?
 - > How to deal with heavy background clutter?
- Robots have to quickly react on fast changing environments
 - > How to make the approach suitable for online learning?



Online Learning: Using Template Matching




For Robust Matching: Use Sliding Window



What Features to Use?

2D Color gradients









Computation:

$$\mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{G}}(x) = \frac{\partial \hat{\mathcal{C}}}{\partial x}$$

$$\hat{\mathcal{C}}(x) = \underset{\mathcal{C} \in \{R,G,B\}}{\operatorname{arg\,max}} \left\| \frac{\partial \mathcal{C}}{\partial x} \right\|$$


Similarity Measure:

$$f_{\mathcal{G}}(\mathcal{O}_{\mathcal{G}}(r), \mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{G}}(t)) = |\mathcal{O}_{\mathcal{G}}(r)^{\top} \mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{G}}(t)|$$

- fast to compute
- robust to illumination changes
- mainly lie on the contour of the object

What Features to Use?

3D Surface Normals









Computation:

$$\mathcal{D}(x + dx) - \mathcal{D}(x) = dx^{\top} \nabla \mathcal{D} + h.o.t.$$

$$X = \vec{v}(x)\mathcal{D}(x),$$

$$X_1 = \vec{v}(x + [1, 0]^\top)(\mathcal{D}(x) + [1, 0]^\top \hat{\nabla \mathcal{D}}),$$


$$X_2 = \vec{v}(x + [0, 1]^\top)(\mathcal{D}(x) + [0, 1]^\top \hat{\nabla \mathcal{D}}).$$

Similarity Measure:

$$f_{\mathcal{D}}(\mathcal{O}_{\mathcal{D}}(r), \mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{D}}(t)) = \mathcal{O}_{\mathcal{D}}(r)^{\top} \mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{D}}(t)$$

- fast to compute
- robust on larger areas
- mainly lie on the interior of the object

2D Color Gradients and 3D Surface Normals are Complementary!




Similarity Measure: Invariant to Small Deformations

State-of-the-art template matching:

$$\mathcal{E}(\{\mathcal{I}_m\}_{m\in\mathcal{M}}, \mathcal{T}, c) = \sum_{(r,m)\in\mathcal{P}} \left(f_m(\mathcal{O}_m(r), \mathcal{I}_m(c+r)) \right)$$



Our approach (invariant to small deformations):



$$\mathcal{E}(\{\mathcal{I}_m\}_{m\in\mathcal{M}}, \mathcal{T}, c) = \sum_{(r,m)\in\mathcal{P}} \left(\max_{t\in\mathcal{R}(c+r)} f_m(\mathcal{O}_m(r), \mathcal{I}_m(t)) \right)$$


$$f_{\mathcal{G}}(\mathcal{O}_{\mathcal{G}}(r), \mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{G}}(t)) = |\mathcal{O}_{\mathcal{G}}(r)^{\top} \mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{G}}(t)|$$


$$f_{\mathcal{D}}(\mathcal{O}_{\mathcal{D}}(r), \mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{D}}(t)) = \mathcal{O}_{\mathcal{D}}(r)^{\top} \mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{D}}(t)$$

3D Surface Normal Measure

2D Gradient Measure

We first *discretize* the gradient orientation and *spread* them around the initial position ...






Evaluating the similarity score for each template and each image location separatly would be very inefficient!

...due to the discretization we can efficiently precompute gradient response maps for each feature once using precomputed look-up tables ...


... instead of computing the similarity response for each template separatly and over and over again.




Due to the feature *spreading* we have *invariance to small translations*. Therefore we only have to consider each **i'th pixel**...


... since modern processors always load a whole cache line into memory and use vectorized operations we would not fully exploit this technology if considering only each i'th pixel ...


... therefore we **linearize** the gradient response maps in order to be able to use **SSE instructions** and in order **to avoid cache misses.**




Matching then means only to **sum up** as many linear memories as we have different features (with a certain **offset** relative to the original feature location). E.g. for a VGA image we only need 300*G instruction calls per template (using SSE)!






Revisited: What are the Problems/Solutions with Texture-less objects?

- ➤ How to guarantee robustness and speed: sliding window & efficient similarity score
- ➤ How to evaluate this similarity measure robustly: invariance & robust features & align features exactly with the image
- ➤ What kind of robust features to use instead: **2D color gradients** & **3D surface normals**
- ➤ How to evaluate this similarity measure efficiently: using response maps & invariance & feature quantization
- > How to make the approach suitable for online learning: use template matching


Future Work:

Use color as feature


• Learn from a 3D model


• Make runtime sublinear
